

## Protecting the Right to Vote: Where the Presidential Candidates Stand

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) is committed to open and fair elections. The landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965 stopped states from enacting racially discriminatory voting restrictions. Yet over the past decade, laws fostering voter suppression across states and localities have been on the rise. The 2013 *Shelby County v. Holder* Supreme Court decision gutted key protections, making way for discriminatory and restrictive voting laws that disproportionately impact people of color, women, voters with disabilities, and young and older voters.

In our post-*Shelby* world, laws have been enacted by state legislatures making our rights to vote infinitely harder.<sup>2</sup> These restrictive measures include strict photo ID requirements, closing of polling locations, voter purges, limiting translations of voting materials, limitations to absentee ballots or same day voter registration, felony disenfranchisement, digital disinformation, and the drawing of election districts in such a way that diminishes the power of voters of color. With so much at stake each time we head to the ballot box, particularly in an election year when Americans are struggling against a pandemic and economic crisis, it's crucial that everyone is able to make their voice heard. The 2020 presidential candidates have weighed in on how they would protect the right to vote.
